	<p>RESIDENCY UK nationals living in Germany should ensure that they are correctly registered with their local <i>Einwohnermeldeamt</i>.</p> <p>After Brexit, UK nationals, irrespective of whether they have in the past been issued with an '<i>unbefristete Aufenthaltserlaubnis</i>', will have to apply to their local <i>Ausländerbehörde</i> for a new residence permit to continue living in Germany.</p> <p>See our guidance: https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/germany-residence-information-after-eu-exit/foreigners-authorities-in-germany</p> 
	<p>PASSPORTS If you want to travel to other EU countries after exit day, adult and child passports should be valid for at least 6 months from your date of travel. Before you book travel, use this tool to check that your passport is valid: https://www.passport.service.gov.uk/check-a-passport</p> <p>Additionally, German Foreigners' Authorities have advised that residence permits will need to be renewed every time you renew your passport.</p> 
	<p>HEALTHCARE If you are working in Germany and paying German social security contributions, your healthcare via a German health insurance company (<i>Krankenkasse</i>) will not be affected by Brexit.</p> <p>If the UK leaves the EU without a deal and your healthcare is currently provided for by the UK government via a S1 form, this form may no longer be recognised after Brexit. In this case, you would be required to join a German <i>Krankenkasse</i> within 3 months of exit day.</p> <p>If the UK leaves the EU without a deal, UK-issued European Health Insurance Cards (EHIC) might no longer be recognised in Germany. Students should join a German health insurer within 3 months or contract private insurance.</p> <p>If you have any further questions, please email us at healthcare.germany@fco.gov.uk</p> 
	<p>DRIVING UK nationals resident in Germany should exchange their UK driving licence for a German driving licence before Brexit.</p> <p>Your local <i>Bürgeramt</i> will be able to advise on where to do this. You will be allowed to drive on your German licence when visiting the UK. An International Driving Permit is not a suitable alternative to exchanging your licence.</p>
	<p>PROFESSIONAL QUALIFICATIONS If you hold UK professional qualifications you should get them recognised in Germany before Brexit.</p> <p>Find out how to do this at https://www.anerkennung-in-deutschland.de/</p>
